We talked about how to shelter in place and learned that we could seal our doors and windows with plastic and duct tape, if a hazardous release occurred. We were reminded how not to panic when we must make a 9-1-1 call for help, and we talked about knowing our home addresses, posting the numbers where emergency responders can easily see them, and listening to the dispatchers instructions before hanging up. We played a game as we learned about creating a Ready Kit; compete with water, food, medications, personal items, etc., that we can use when the power is out or if we need to remain self-sufficient for several days. Each age group added their own flavor to the discussions and we were even able to consider our plans in case Zombies head our way! (Thanks, Alston and Bailey!)

Children are our future. Sometimes we just have to take the time and venture outside of our own little world and give of ourselves to others. What we gain back is way more than we give, and we can only hope that we make a difference to someone.
